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Australia New Zealand Police Pursuit Principles

Purpose:

These Principles support the development and application of policies and procedures that govern police pursuits. The Principles aim to promote cross-jurisdictional consistency across police organisations to enable opportunities for continuous improvement in the safe management of police pursuits.

Definition:

A pursuit is where:

- a police officer, in a police vehicle, directs the driver of a motor vehicle to stop; and
- the motor vehicle fails to stop; and
- a police motor vehicle continues to follow.
