2019 Year in Review

Welcome to the last newsletter for 2019. It has been a huge year for the ANZPAA NIFS team and the forensic science community as a whole. Collectively we have achieved so much in 2019.

Early this year, we signed another threeyear Service Level Agreement with our stakeholders to continue support to ANZPAA NIFS. With this, we have developed a new look three-year ANZPAA NIFS Strategic Plan 2019-22, see

Our project activities included:

- The Forensic Fundamentals project, which reduces risk to forensic science service providers by providing greater visibility of the underpinning science behind the forensic science disciplines, and proactively identifies areas for further research and empirical testing. We also finalised the Empirical Study Design in Forensic Science – A Guideline to Forensic Fundamentals.
- A Multi-Disciplinary Approach to
 Crime Scene Management guideline,
 which shares the learnings from
 jurisdictions that have made significant
 process and practice changes in recent
 years with those that may be interested in
 taking a similar approach.

- A Model Framework for Double Blind System Testing in Forensic Science that will improve quality, mitigate risk, increase standardisation, reduce duplication, and aid understanding of sources and rates of error in forensic casework.
- The Drug and Fingerprint Analysis
 Workflow Mapping Projects identified workflow efficiencies for jurisdictions.
- The Case Record Review in Forensic Biology represents a co-ordinated effort to address the risks raised in the Ross Inquiry (WA). It will assist in addressing an identified gap in understanding within the forensic community in relation to the implementation of a risk-based approach, entailed in new accreditation (ISO 17025) requirements.
- A guideline for Transitioning Technology from the Laboratory to the Field which provides a standardised and streamlined approach to these transitions to reduce duplication.
- We completed the Australasian Forensic Science Assessment Body (AFSAB)
 Review Implementation Project and commenced an AFSAB Enhancement
